Part 1 —What is History?

History helps us examine evidence and build research skills which can be used in all walks of life. Being able to decipher between primary and secondary sources and figure the facts from the opinions will assist in anything from solving problems, dealing with disputes to evidencing your work and research now and in the future. Examining the past can also help us answer questions like "how" or "why" things are happening now...

Discuss—5 minutes

What significant events are happening in the world today, do you know why they are happening, what led to them and what we can learn from this?

Part 2 — Evidence

We can learn from history books, tv programmes, and the all-powerful internet. But these are rarely the primary sources. Articles online, books written by the most experienced historians and tv programmes hosted by famous people are all well and good – but where did they get their information from?

Discuss—5 mins— Where can original evidence be sourced from?

Part 3 —Archives

If history is that gig you went to last year, an archive is your gig ticket that you decided to keep, or the blog post you wrote about it. It's the evidence behind the story. Archivists collect and protect that evidence and researchers use this evidence to put together a story.

Quite simply: The past is the past; history is the story we tell about the past. Archives are the storybooks and archivists and researchers are the storytellers.
